KEVIN'S KORNER

There's a painting called "The First Thanksgiving, 1621" by Jean Leon Gerome Ferris. It depicts an idealized image of the feast among Pilgrims and Native Americans in the Plymouth Colony. Like many other images or stories, the painting conveys a sense of how we hope things would be, without as much attention to the harsh realities of human life and behavior. In order to get a more complete picture, we sometimes have to dig deeper.

Robert Tracie McKenzie has done some of that in his book, *The First Thanksgiving*. He explores both the heroism and the weaknesses of the first American pilgrims. McKenzie writes:

There is much to admire about the "company of plain Englishmen" who disembarked from the Mayflower almost four centuries ago. They were men and women [who] exhibited enormous courage in the face of unspeakable hardship and loss. They loved their children, they loved the body of Christ, and they abandoned everything that was familiar to them to serve both... They have [given] us an invaluable Christian example of belief, action, and endurance.

But human frailty is part of the Pilgrims' story as well. They argued among themselves. They were frequently duped both by strangers and purported friends. They were ethnocentric and sometimes self-righteous. They struggled with their finances... They were frightened by wolves. They got lost in the woods... A key leader got caught by an Indian deer trap and dangled helplessly upside down... In years to come, they would have a hard time keeping a pastor...and many of their number would move away in search of larger farms, prompting William

Bradford to speak of the Plymouth church as "an ancient mother grown old and forsaken of her children."

Their flaws may shock us, but it wouldn't have shocked the Pilgrims. They seemed to glory in how God could use them despite their weakness and sinfulness. One of their key leaders (Robert Cushman) said, "Our voyage...hath been as full of crosses as ourselves have been of crookedness, but God can do much." Another leader (Edward Winslow) said, "How few, weak, and raw were we at our first beginning, and yet God preserved us." William Bradford gloried in their weaknesses, but his object in doing so is clear: "that their children may see with what difficulties their fathers wrestled in going through these things in their first beginnings; and how God brought them along, notwithstanding all their weaknesses and infirmities."

As we enter into this season of gratitude and gifts, it's important to remember not only the best of human aspirations and actions, but also the worst of the human condition, including our own brokenness, sinfulness, and weakness. When we see ourselves, and those who've come before us, more honestly and clearly, we may also be able to see the mercy, love, and faithfulness of God that has redeemed us, upheld us, and brought us through. And for that, more than anything, we give thanks.

FAILING TO PROTECT OUR FUTURE

An article from the Indian Head United Methodist bulletin

Read - 2 Samuel 11:1-17

In the Bible we learned that Esau sold his future to Jacob for a bowl of stew. His blindness to what was truly valuable caused him to lose his inheritance. Other Bible stories can teach us additional lessons about protecting our future.

David was chosen by God to lead the nation, and for many years, he pursued the Lord's plan. However, his desire for Bathsheba led him to commit adultery with her and make arrangements for her husband to die. Because he made the choice to gratify his own wishes instead of following God's way, he fell into sin. When confronted by the prophet Nathan, David sincerely repented (2 Sam. 12:7, 13), but he and his family were deeply affected by his mistake.

Samson was another individual who knew what the Lord required but chose to disobey – like David, he gave up blessings for temporary pleasure. Losing sight of God's purpose, Samson chose instead to please his untrustworthy companion Delilah (Judg. 16:15-17). As a result, he spent his last years in disgrace.

A third example is Judas Iscariot, who wanted Jesus to establish the kingdom of God immediately. Because he valued earthly matters above spiritual ones, he rejected Jesus' teachings and tried to manipulate events to his own liking. He was convinced that he knew what was right – that he knew better than God.

To avoid the kind of mistakes these men made, we must commit to setting aside our own desires in favor of God's will. In other words, we must cherish the eternal over the temporal and be satisfied with what the Lord has planned.
