#### **KEVIN'S KORNER**

On September 13, our congregation will celebrate 62 years of God's faithfulness. As far as I know, this will be the first church anniversary we've observed in the midst of a pandemic. Our celebration will be scaled back a lot. We won't be able to have many of the things that we ordinarily include in that special day. But it's still important, and perhaps this year even more important, that we recognize and give thanks for God's presence and work among us over time.

Across more than six decades, God has guided Grace Baptist Church through all kinds of events and experiences. These weren't just circumstances to endure or situations to survive. They were also chapters in our church's story where we grew in knowing God and knowing ourselves. We went deeper into the assurance of God's promises and matured in our reliance on his purposes. We didn't just make it through; we made it forward, and arrived at a new spot in our congregation's mission.

I think of the early church in the book of Acts, especially the challenges it faced and the things that looked like barriers to the spread of the gospel. Yet somehow, by God's sovereign love and the Spirit's guidance, what at first appeared to be obstacles turned out to be opportunities. In late June, I preached on one such episode, when Peter and John went straight from prison time to praying time (Acts 4:23-31). When

hardship – in this case, persecution – threatened the life of the community of believers, they and their leaders didn't turn to their own resolve and resources. No, they turned to God and looked to him for the courage needed to be faithful in their public witness.

In this case, they didn't focus on praying for safety and divine protection. Instead, they prayed for boldness. They looked to the God who is the creator of the world and all its inhabitants, and asked for divine power to keep testifying to what he had done through the death and resurrection of Jesus. Rather than praying, "Lord, keep your hand of protection over us," they prayed, "Lord, stretch out your hand and do signs and wonders." This fellowship of disciples wasn't in retreat mode. It was continually in mission mode, especially in the face of trial and troubles.

I recall the words of Steve Green's song, "Find Us Faithful": "We're pilgrims on the journey / Of the narrow road / And those who've gone before us line the way / Cheering on the faithful, encouraging the weary / Their lives a stirring testament to God's sustaining grace. / O may all who come behind us find us faithful..."

Eventually, when we come through this pandemic and return to a kind of church life that's closer to what we used to know, we'll be able to look back and see even more clearly how God has been present with us and working through us for the good of the gospel. And if

we think about a time even further down the road, when future believers will reflect on this chapter in our church's history, may they be able to say that the folks who were here in this congregation in the fall of 2020 journeyed through that period with unshakeable hope and a receptiveness to the leadership and creativity of the Holy Spirit.

#### **GRACE'S RECIPE BOX**

#### **Pumpkin Bread**

3 cups sugar

1 cup cooking oil

1 (1 pound) can of pumpkin

4 eggs

2/3 cup water

3 1/2 cups self-rising flour

2 teaspoons pumpkin pie spice

Cream all ingredients together. Add to two 9 x 5 greased and floured loaf pans. Bake at 350° for 1 hour or until done.

#### **Hummingbird Cake**

2 cups sugar 3 cups flour 1 tsp. cinnamon

1 tsp. baking soda

1 tsp. salt

Sift together in a large bowl. Add:

2 cups diced bananas, ripe

1 1/2 tsp. vanilla

1 (8-oz.) can crushed pineapple with juice (saving 2 tablespoons of juice)

½ cup grated nuts

Stir to blend; do not beat. Pour into a greased and floured tube pan. Bake for 1 hour and 20 minutes at  $325^{\circ}$ . Glaze with a mixture of:

1 T. melted butter (not oleo)

2 T. pineapple juice

Enough powdered sugar to thicken

Pour over warm cake.
