# **KEVIN'S KORNER**

After spending most of April reflecting on the meaning of Jesus' resurrection, during May we turn our attention more to the Holy Spirit. The Holy Spirit is God's personal, empowering presence, working in our lives as we follow Jesus, individually and together. The Holy Spirit has many roles in the life of the church. One of these jobs is to sanctify believers.

Sanctification is basically about growing in holiness, which means being made more and more into the likeness of Christ. John Wesley, one of the great figures in the Methodist movement, used the analogy of a house to describe the ongoing experience of salvation. He said that prevenient grace, that is, God's divine love that reaches out to us and awakens in us our need for deliverance, is like the front porch. Justification, that is, pardon or forgiveness, is the door. And sanctification, that is, holiness or new birth, is what enables us to walk around in the rooms of the house. In the 1740s, Wesley told some of his followers, "God can do something with sin beyond forgiving it!" In other words, God wants to take us beyond forgiveness and into transformation. He wants to restore his image in us. He wants us to be holy, as he is holy.

Throughout the history of the church, Christians have prayed, "Come, Holy Spirit!" Praying that kind of prayer shows that we trust God to meet us where we are. We don't have to attain to great spiritual heights in order to encounter God and be changed. No, God descends to us in order to remake us through Christ. God shows up in all kinds of circumstances, including our present journey through and beyond the coronavirus pandemic. We can count on the Holy Spirit to take our present situation and use it as an opportunity for doing new things.

But we have to be open and receptive to the operation of the Holy Spirit in our lives and in our church. God doesn't take newness and impose it on us. If we as a church want to learn from our COVID-19 experience, and be renewed to go forward with fresh energy, then we need to stay humble and repentant, ready to grow and mature in our faith. We need to keep praying, "Come, Holy Spirit!" To that end, I share with you another prayer, from the book *Gathering for Worship:* 

Spirit of God,
you are the breath of creation,
the wind of change that blows through our lives,
opening us up to new dreams, and new hopes,
new life in Jesus Christ.
Forgive us our closed minds
which barricade themselves against new ideas,
preferring the past to what you might want to do
through us tomorrow.
Forgive us our closed eyes
which fail to see the needs of your world,
blind to opportunities of service and love.

Forgive us our closed hands which clutch our gifts and our wealth for our own use alone.
Forgive us our closed hearts which limit our affections to ourselves and our own.

Spirit of new life, forgive us and break down the prison walls of our selfishness, that we might be open to your love and open for the service of your world; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

May the Holy Spirit continue to bring renewal to you and to our life together as a congregation.

## **GRACE'S RECIPE BOX**

## Oatmeal Apple Raisin Muffins

1 egg
3/4 cup milk
1 cup raisins
1 chopped apple
1/2 cup oil
1 cup all-purpose flour
1 cup quick oats
1/3 cup sugar
3 teaspoons baking powder
1 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon nutmeg

2 teaspoons cinnamon

Beat egg; stir in remaining ingredients, mixing just to moisten. Pour into 12 greased muffin cups until ¾ full. Bake at 400° for 15 to 20 minutes. Serve cool or piping hot with butter.

## <u>Mother's Day Breakfast Casserole</u> Jan Thompson

This can be made the night before and baked in the morning...

12 eggs scrambled real soft – still runny. Pour into 9 x 13 pan sprayed with Pam. Add 1 cup sour cream, stirring and spreading over eggs while still hot. Sprinkle with 1 lb crumbled crisp bacon, 10 oz grated cheddar cheese, and 10 oz tater tots over top. Bake at 325° for 30 minutes or until eggs are set and cheese is melted and bubbly.

# HOW TO DISPLAY THE AMERICAN FLAG

Hours: Flags should be flown from sun-up until sun-down unless there is a spot light for night.

Conditions: Unless you have an all weather flag, you should bring in the flag in bad weather conditions.

Position: The flag should always be displayed upright with the union to the top left. Flying with the union down is considered bad etiquette. It can be used as a call for help in extreme danger or need of assistance.

Locations: The flag should be displayed on or near every polling place on election days.

The flag should be displayed on or near the main administration building of all public institutions.

The flag should be displayed on or near every school house during school days, but it is not required.



### **MAY DAY**

The custom of celebrating May Day, May 1, can be traced to the ancient spring rituals connected with fertility and growth. In 15<sup>th</sup> century England, May Day festivities were celebrated with dances around the Maypole and were also tied to the figure of Robin Hood, whom local youths impersonated in MORRIS DANCES and dramatic performances.

May Day later was designated as a labor holiday celebrated by parades, demonstrations, and speeches by labor unions and political parties. May Day parades are often prominent displays of military strength.



### MEMORIAL DAY

Memorial Day, May 30, 1868, was established by Congress to honor U.S. soldiers who died in the Civil War. It was a day to decorate their graves with flowers. In the South it is sometimes called Decoration Day. But over the years it became a time to honor all those who have given their lives in all armed conflict fought by U.S. Forces. Memorial Day is celebrated as one of our "Monday Holidays."

## **MEMORIAL DAY RED POPPIES**



Two days before the end of World War I, a UMCA worker, Moina Michael, inspired by John McCrae's poem "We Shall Not Sleep" (later renamed "In Flanders Fields") vowed to wear a red poppy of Flanders Fields as a remembrance of all who died. She promoted the idea of wearing red poppies on Memorial Day to honor America's war dead. She sold poppies to raise money to support servicemen in need of financial help. By 1922, the Veterans of Foreign Wars was distributing poppies nationally with sales to raise money to support disabled veterans. In 1948, Moina Michael was honored by the issue of a three-cent postage stamp showing her portrait, a poppy, and the words, "Founder of Memorial Poppy."

### **MOTHER'S DAY**

Mother's Day began in Grafton, West Virginia by Anna Jarvis in 1905 after the death of her mother. The first Mother's Day was held in the former Andrews Methodist Episcopal Church in downtown Grafton which is now the International Mother's Day Shrine.

## **FATHER'S DAY**

Father's Day began in Spokane, Washington by Sonora Smart Dodd on the 19<sup>th</sup> of June in 1910. She got the idea from a Mother's Day sermon in 1909. She was raised by her father and wanted to honor him. Roses are the Father's Day flowers: red to be worn for a living father and white if the father passed away.
