KEVIN'S KORNER

By the time we celebrate our church's anniversary later this month, we'll already be into the transition from summer to fall.

Navigating from one season into the next is more than just a reminder that weather patterns change and the created world looks and feels different. Changing seasons also remind us that we inhabit time. We move through history. As our years come and go, we occupy different periods of life. And in each period, we need to be responsive to what God is calling us to be and to do.

The same is true for the life of a congregation. Throughout its 65 years of worship, work, and witness, our church has remained focused on and grounded in the faithful love of God, revealed most of all through Jesus Christ. This has given our congregation stability and durability across time. True, circumstances and contexts have changed at many points along the way. We've been through seasons of abundance and seasons of scarcity. Seasons of joy and seasons of sorrow. Seasons of clarity and seasons of confusion. Seasons of unity and seasons of disorder. From there, the Teacher goes on to spell out other "seasons" that mark our mortal existence, all with the assurance that God, who is sovereign, has not left us.

God has certainly never left Grace Baptist Church. When we gather for worship on September 17, we'll assemble to give thanks for and rejoice in the powerful presence of God, working in and through our congregation. Our guest speaker will be Curtis Bridges. Some of you know Curtis and his wife Tricia from their previous relationship with our church and our participation in their work of advancing the gospel. We look forward to renewing our fellowship with them and renewing our commitment to the future that God has for them and for us.

In his book, How to Inhabit Time, James K. A. Smith writes: "While minutes, days, and years carve up and measure the cosmic time of Earth's course around a dwarf star, for temporal creatures like us, the season is

perhaps the most natural form of timekeeping. The answer to the question "When am I?" isn't six o'clock or 2022; it is more like youth, middle age, chapter 3 of a life. The same is true collectively and communally, whether a marriage, an institution, or even a nation. To ask "When are we?" isn't a question of counting years as much as discerning a season, knowing what to expect, remembering that, in every season, we revolve around the Son" (pp. 123-24).

As we celebrate God's faithfulness across 65 years, may he help us discern our church's season, and enable us to respond to what he's calling us to be and to do at this time.

Patriot Day is observed on September 11. Flags should be flown at half-staff until sunset that day.


Grace Baptist Church is celebrating its' 65th anniversary on Sunday, September 17 with

GRACE'S RECIPE BOX

Wonderful Sweet Potato Soufflé

3 cups mashed sweet potatoes
3/4 cup white sugar
1/3 cup butter, softened
2 eggs
1 tsp. vanilla extract
1/2 cup milk
1 cup flaked coconut
1/3 cup all-purpose flour
1 cup packed brown sugar
1 cup chopped walnuts
1/3 cup melted butter

Preheat oven to 350°. Combine the mashed sweet potatoes with the white sugar, soft butter or margarine, beaten eggs, vanilla and milk. Spoon into a 2-quart ovenproof baking dish. Combine the coconut, flour, brown sugar, chopped nuts and melted butter. Sprinkle over the top of the sweet potatoes. Bake at 350° for 30-35 minutes.

Shoe Peg Corn Casserole

1 can French-style green beans, drained
1 can shoe peg corn, drained
1 can cream of celery soup
½ cup celery, chopped
½ cup onions, chopped
1 sm. Ctn. Sour cream
½ cup cheese, grated
Salt and pepper
½ cup (1 stick) butter
¾ roll Ritz crackers, crushed
1 sm. pkg. slivered almonds

Mix together green beans, corn, soup, celery, onions, sour cream, grated cheese, salt & pepper. Pour into large baking dish. Melt butter, mix with cracker crumbs and almonds. Put on top of casserole. Bake at 350° for about 30 minutes.
