KEVIN'S KORNER

Luke opens the book of Acts (1:1-11) with a story that's both a homecoming and a homegoing. From God's vantage point, it must have seemed more like a homecoming. Here comes the risen Jesus, returning to where it all started. He comes back to his heavenly home to participate fully in the glory of God. He takes his place at the right hand of God, where he gets to rule with the Creator of the universe.

Meanwhile, back on planet earth, it must have seemed more like a homegoing. There goes Jesus, making a dramatic exit. Remember that the risen Christ had given his disciples one last round of instruction on the subject of God's kingdom. But now the time has come for them to say farewell to their Lord. "He was taken up before their very eyes," says Luke, "and a cloud hid him from their sight" (v. 9).

Sometimes we focus so much on Christ's resurrection that we neglect the importance of his ascension. We lose sight of the fact that God not only brought Jesus up from the grave but also took him up to the life of the world to come, where Jesus now reigns with God over a redeemed world. And our job as believers is to bear witness to God's reign, to announce that Jesus is Lord, so that others can share in the salvation that God has worked through Christ. That's our mission, our reason for existing as a church.

One of the reasons we have this mission is because God has not disclosed the details of his own long range plan. When Jesus' disciples asked him to give them a more precise schedule about the coming of God's kingdom, Jesus told them, "It is not for you to know the times or dates the Father has set by his own authority" (v. 7). So we know that God's project of redemption is underway. We know that he has promised to bring it to completion. But the specific timetable is out of our hands. What is in our hands is the opportunity to work in the here and now in ways that testify to the good news of God's kingdom.

As Jesus was ascending, two angelic witnesses ask, "Men of Galilee, why do you stand here looking into the sky? This same Jesus, who has been taken from you into heaven, will come back in the same way you have seen him go into heaven" (v. 11). So Christians are not commissioned to be full-time sky watchers. On the contrary, as we wait for our Lord's return, our eyes are to be focused on the challenges, needs, and opportunities that surround us in the present. There are souls to be saved, injustices to be righted, peace to be made, suffering to be alleviated, and problems to be solved.

Maybe this is one of the reasons why the up-toheaven story of Jesus' ascension is immediately followed by the down-to-earth story of the church choosing a replacement for Judas (1:1226). Notice how quickly Luke takes us from staring at the clouds to staring at other people, real, live human beings who identify themselves with Christ and are part of this community of witnesses placed in the world to spread the gospel. This community needs to get itself organized for the unfinished business of God's reign. So the community gathers, prays, seeks, and decides. Matthias is chosen to replace Judas. It's these daily, ground level choices and commitments that will have to be made if the church is going to work out its witness in the world.

Here in the life of Grace Baptist Church, we continue to participate, day in and day out, in the ongoing story of God's redemption of the world through our Lord Jesus Christ. We always have been, and always will be, a community of hope. We're a forward-looking fellowship, led by the Spirit into more of what God has promised. Christ reigns! Let's continue to proclaim this and practice this, until he comes.

NATIONAL DAY OF PRAYER

The National Day of Prayer is the first Thursday in May. This day was enacted by President Reagan in 1988. The most visible gathering is at our nation's Capital in Washington, D.C. All the branches of government are represented as well as the military. Thousands of events are held nationwide. Local volunteers hold a variety of activities ranging from prayer breakfasts, Bible reading marathons, concerts of prayer, rallies, church prayer vigils, student flagpole gatherings and observances held in sports stadiums.



MAY DAY

The custom of celebrating May Day, May 1, can be traced to ancient spring rituals connected with fertility and growth. In 15th century England, May Day festivities were celebrated with dances around the Maypole and were also tied to the figure of Robin Hood, whom local youths impersonated in MORRIS DANCES and dramatic performances.

May Day was later designated as a labor holiday celebrated by parades, demonstrations, and speeches by labor unions and political parties. May Day parades are often prominent displays of military strength.



Mother's Day began in Grafton, West Virginia by Anna Jarvis in 1905 after the death of her mother. The first Mother's Day commemoration was held in the former Andrews Methodist Episcopal Church in downtown Grafton which is now the international Mother's Day Shrine.

Father's Day

Father's Day began in Spokane, Washington by Sonora Smart Dodd on the 19th of June in 1910. She got the idea from a Mother's Day sermon in 1909 and wanted to honor her dad who had raised her.

Red to be worn for a living father and white if the father has passed away.







RECIPE BOX

Raisin Honey Drops

34 cup of honey

¾ cup sugar

34 cup butter or margarine

1 egg

2 cups sifted flour

1 tsp each salt and cinnamon

½ tsp soda

2 cups uncooked rolled oats

1 cup seedless raisins

Cream honey, sugar, butter, and egg. Sift together flour, salt, cinnamon, soda. Stir into creamed mixture. Add rolled oats and raisins. Drop by heaping teaspoonfuls onto greased cookie sheet. Bake on upper shelf in oven preheated at 375° for 12 to 14 min. till lightly browned. Cool on racks. Makes about 4 dozen.

Orange Pineapple Cake

Yellow cake mix

4 eggs

1 very large ctn. Cool Whip

1 box vanilla instant pudding mix

½ cup oil

1 can mandarin oranges with juice

1 large can drained crushed pineapple

Combine cake mix, oil, eggs and oranges with mixer until oranges are fine. Grease and flour 3 (8-inch) cake pans and bake at 350° for 25 minutes or until tests done. **Topping:** Blend together Cool Whip, pineapple and pudding mix. Frost cake. Keep in refrigerator.
