KEVIN'S KORNER

At the conclusion of our June 8 worship service, I announced my plans to retire, and to bring my ministry as your pastor to a close on Sunday, August 31. This decision came after an extended period of thought, prayer, and discernment, as Debby and I sought the Lord together about his calling and work at this particular season in our lives. During the time since my announcement, you have continued to surround us with faithfulness, kindness, and encouragement as we follow the Lord with you. Your love and prayers have been deeply appreciated as we've all taken the first steps into this time of transition for our church.

Working on this newsletter article prompted me to look back to the series of articles I wrote during the first several months of my ministry with you, May through October 2001. I used those initial articles to answer the question, What does it mean to be your pastor? In the process, I explored five essential aspects of my call and our covenant with each other. Being your pastor means:

- I want to be available and accessible to you.
- I want to be a faithful minister of the Word, especially through preaching and teaching.

- I want to provide leadership for the congregation as we live out our Godgiven mission.
- I want to build up the congregation as a community of faith.
- I want to live a prayerful life that models the way of Christ.

Though there are certainly additional dimensions of effective pastoral ministry and a fruitful partnership, I look back with gratitude for all the ways that God has enabled you and me to live into our promises to him and to one another. For more than 24 years, God has worked to accomplish his kingdom purposes in us and to form us into the likeness of Christ, for his glory.

Remember that this redeeming, reconciling, restoring work of God continues over the next two months as well, while I'm still with you. Our remaining time with each other isn't an occasion for idleness but an opportunity to move deeper into our love for each other and our witness in the world. I'll be working primarily with our deacons and other leaders in the church to seek God's way forward and to make plans for the initial steps in a season of transition for our congregation. Along with our church's leaders, each of you will play an important role in shaping our church's life toward the future, especially through your prayers and your faithful participation. From a pastoral perspective, one of my favorite Scripture passages has always been Paul's opening expression of gratitude in his letter to the community of believers in Philippi: "I thank my God every time I remember you. In all my prayers for all of you, I always pray with joy because of your partnership in the gospel from the first day until now, being confident of this, that he who began a good work in you will carry it on to completion until the day of Christ Jesus" (1:3-6). Notice how Paul starts out by speaking of the journey that he has already traveled with them. He reminds them of how he and they have already invested themselves in the gospel and in each other. Then he moves from their past journey to prospects for the future. Paul's confidence is in the faithfulness of God. God's promises are reliable. He completes what he begins. So the Philippians can be assured that God will bring their story of salvation to a glorious conclusion.

As you and I spend our final two months together, remember that this part of our story is a moment in the greater story of God's saving work. Looking back, we give thanks. Looking forward, we anticipate what God has promised. And here in the present, we'll keep loving, serving, and rejoicing in Christ.

Although August is the eighth month of the calendar year, it was actually the sixth month in the early Roman calendar.

August was named after Gaius Julius Caesar Augustus, the great-nephew of Julius Caesar. He became the first emperor of the Roman Empire. "Augustus" means "the revered one."

August has two birthstones – Peridot, green in color, is the one that is commonly known and Sardonyx, a gem with white and brown bands that was once believed to have mystical powers.

August also has two official flowers: The poppy and gladiolus.

Colorado became the 38th state in the United States on August 1, 1878.

Notables born in August include Francis Scott Key, Annie Oakley, Meriwether Lewis, Benjamin Harrison, Orville Wright, and Leonard Bernstein.

The 19th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution, which gave women the right to vote, proclaimed on August 26, 1920.

GRACE'S RECIPE BOX

Crab Soup

- 1 lb. Fresh crab meat
- 1 (10 ³⁄₄) can tomato soup
- 1 (11 ¹/₂ oz) can green pea soup
- 3 cups milk
- 2 tbsp butter
- 1 cup chopped celery
- 1/2 cup finely chopped onion
- 2 bay leaves ¹/₄ tsp. Hot pepper sauce
- ¹/₄ tsp. Worcestershire sauce
- Salt and pepper to taste

Sauté celery and onion in butter until soft and golden. Add soup and milk, then crab meat and seasonings. Simmer for about half an hour. Makes 2 quarts

(Maryland is for crabs. This soup is a must during the summer time)
